Freshwater biodiversity - the life in ponds, rivers and wetlands - is one of the most threatened parts of the natural world. To safeguard Oxfordshire's special freshwater wildlife we're protecting, restoring and recreating a network of freshwater and wetland habitats across the county. We're starting by focussing on fens, floodplains and ponds, the richest and most vulnerable parts of the freshwater landscape.

The project aims to connect local people directly with nature's recovery and harness the power of community networks in tackling the decline of some of the region's endangered wetland plants.
